Summary

The Conference Scholarship, Diversity Scholarship, and Su Matthews Hale Women Lead award were launched this year at the AIGA Design Conference in Minneapolis. They all aim to reinforce AIGA's position on equity and its commitment to being an inclusive organization, that continually represents and advocates for the multi-faceted definitions of diversity – including gender, ability, cultural and ethnic origins, race as well as age and socio-economic conditions.

Conference Scholarship

This Scholarship was launched by the Diversity & Inclusion (D&I) initiative. Four members were selected by jury members Jacinda Walker, Chair of the D&I task force, and active task force leaders George Garrastegui Jr, Phim Her, and Jesse Singh. Funded by AIGA, it waived the conference ticket fee.

Diversity Scholarship

This scholarship was funded by Google, Amazon and an anonymous donor, as an opportunity to increase representation and recognize active members for their dedication and hard work volunteering on the task force. Four AIGA members of the D&I task force were chosen to receive this scholarship, which included waiving the conference registration fee and covering transportation and accommodation costs.

Su Matthews Hale Women Lead Award

This scholarship helps support talented, high potential female designers starting out in their careers by providing them with scholarships to attend the conference and a one-year membership to AIGA. Four AIGA student group members of the Minneapolis area were chosen for this award by lead faculty members.

Aside from the unique benefits previously mentioned, we made sure all awardees attended The Impact of Inclusion, the first ever Diversity & Inclusion symposium, curated by D&I task force lead Dian Holton. It addressed issues of gender identity, designing for ability, and diversity in the workplace. We also made sure they attended the annual report presentation, and got some one-on-one time with Jacinda Walker, other task force members as well as student scholars during lunch, drink breaks, and Design Fair activities.
